

CHILKAT WEAVING RESEARCH IN THE CONSERVATION LAB

The Alaska State Museum conservation lab has been working on some Chilkat projects. We are partnering with a consortium led by chemists at Portland State University who have been awarded a Mellon grant to analyze cultural heritage materials. Liana Wallace and Ellen Carrlee proposed analysis of dyes in Chilkat robes and established a Chilkat Dye Working Group that meets monthly to collect samples and study robes in the ASM collection. The phases of the project include analyzing reference material from weavers, sampling historic robes in museum collections, and sharing the findings. The Portland-based conservation consortium will be meeting in Juneau in June 2020 to coincide with Celebration and a summer exhibit on Textile Regalia. The Chilkat Dye Working Group has about a dozen weavers participating so far and hopes to develop culturally appropriate sampling protocols this spring as well as dye some wool together at the museum. Active participants have included weavers Lily Hope, Della Cheney, Yarrow Vaara, Liana Wallace, Marsh Hotch, Patty Fiorella, Pamla Credo-Hayes, Irene Lampe, Pattie Adkisson, Nancy Keen, Kay Field Parker, Marcia Stier and Suzi Williams. Conservator Ellen Carrlee is also working with Chilkat weaver Anna Brown Ehlers to co-author a paper for the Alaska Journal of Anthropology about Anna's treatment of the Chilkat Robe (ASM II-B-861) currently on exhibit in the clan house. This paper uses the collaboration as a case study in making space for greater indigenous authority in treatment decisions and explores the challenges and benefits of engagement.


